President's Message

Hello to all our members, supporters and friends, and I hope you're keeping warm and well through the winter so far. Winter often means hibernation, and it's been a bit of a quieter time at the HLTTV over the last few months as we prepare to move into the second half of the year.

In the last Circulator report I mentioned that the 5th floor lung transplant outpatient clinic was relocating, and that the HLTTV were hoping to be involved in the consumer consultation around that move. I'm happy to inform our members that meetings have started, and both myself and Camille (our VP) are involved in the consultation process. There are also other lung transplant recipients on the consultation committee, and we have been told that there will be further opportunities in the future for wider consultation with the community. ing demand. A new ward, 5 West, will be created on the 5th floor where the respiratory clinic and sleep laboratory are currently located. The proposal as it currently stands is for clinical services, research areas and offices to be relocated to the second floor and for a new purpose-built area to be constructed on the ground floor for the sleep laboratory. Under the current proposal the design is slated to improve separation of patients with differing infection risks. An update, via newsletter in June, announced that architects for the project had been chosen and that the timeline had been revised. The Patient Reference Group has been established, 10 diverse respiratory patients were chosen for the group,

A CF Advisory Group will also be consulted for guidance on the

project. The project committee has advised that online roadshows will be held in the next couple of months so that everyone in the patient community has the opportunity to comment on the design They also report that clinical staff are continuing to work closely with the architects, ensuring that functional and clinical requirements are appropriately and accurately reflected in design. The committee have established several design principles based on the priorities identified by staff and patients earlier in the year. These design principles were reviewed by the Patient Reference Committee and the Cystic Fibrosis Advisory Group.



On Your Marks!



This year's Medibank Melbourne Marathon Festival will be held on Sunday 15th of October. Once again this year HLTTV will field a team. Competitors on the HLTTV team will be raising money for the HLTTV whether they are serious competitors or entering to have fun. Those who choose the 42.9km Marathon will circle around Albert Park Lake, Flinders Street Station, and pass the St Kilda beach foreshore before crossing the finish line at the MCG. Half marathon runners will run a slightly different route for their 21.1 kilometres, completing the lake loop and finishing with a lap inside the MCG. Those who choose the 10km run will pass by numerous iconic landmarks such as Flinders Street Station, the Shrine of Remembrance and the Royal Botanic Gardens. The shorter 5.7km run starts on Batman Avenue and loops around the Yarra River before finishing inside the MCG. The smallest distance, the 3 kilometre walk event, starts on Batman Avenue, meanders around small loops at Birrarung Marr and Jolimont Avenue before finishing at the MCG. Details for HLTTV team entry will be posted on the Facebook page and the HLTTV website.

Second Chance Accommodation Program – 2016/17 Snapshot

The Second Chance Accommodation Program at The Park Regis Griffin Suites have provided local accommodation to 35 transplant patients (and their carers) between July 2016 and June 2017. Of the 35 patients accommodated, 32 had received a lung transplant and 3 had received a heart transplant. From June 2016 to October 2016 (four months) the HLLTV funded 6 rooms at the Park Regis. The HLTTV was able to increase number of rooms to 7 rooms in November 2016 due to a generous grant from the Care from Caity Appeal.

As there were 6 HLTTV rooms funded for 4 out of 12 months (123 out of 365 days) and 7 rooms funded for 8 out of 12 months (242 out of 365 days), there was a total of 2432 HLTTV room days available over the 12 month period. Of these 2432 available days, the HLTTV rooms were full for 2248 days and vacant for 184 days. Therefore, each room was occupied for an average of 334 of 365 days (92%) of the year and vacant for an average of 31 of 365 days (8%) of the year.

Heart transplant patients were accommodated for 225 of the 2248 days (10%), while lung transplant patients were accommodated for 2023 of the 2248 total days (90%). The HLTTV is proud to continue to provide this valuable service, and we are committing to 7 rooms as a minimum going forward over the 2017/18 financial year. 

Blue Sky Bran Muffins



Preheat oven to 200°c Lightly cooking spray
1 ½ cup buttermilk
1 large egg
⅓ cup canola oil
⅓ cup dark brown sugar
1 cup blueberries, fresh or frozen
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 cup wheat bran
1 cup all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon baking soda
⅓ teaspoon table salt

Grease a 12-cupmuffin tin.

In a medium bowl, whisk together buttermilk, egg,oil, dark brown sugar, and vanilla extract until well combined. Set aside.

In a large bowl, whisk together wheat bran, flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt until combined.

Pour reserved buttermilk mixture into bowl with dry ingredients. With a spatula, quickly mix until just combined.

Add blueberries to batter and mix until just combined.

Using a ¼ cup measure, pour batter into greased muffin pan.

Bake at 200°c until edges of muffins are golden brown and the interior reaches 88°c on an instant read thermometer, about 16 to 18 minutes.

Remove from oven and let cool on a wire rack in tin for 20 minutes. Remove muffins and let cool.

Store leftover muffins in an airtight container for up to 3 days.

Why is organ and tissue donation important?

One organ and tissue donor can save the lives of up to 10 people and transform the lives of many more. With around 1,400 Australians waiting for a life-saving transplant, and a further 12,000 people on dialysis, the generous act

of organ and tissue donation has a far reaching effect, changing the lives of both transplant recipients and their families.

For those waiting for a transplant, organ and tissue donation can mean the difference between life and death, being healthy and sick, between seeing and being blind, or between being active and never walking again. It enables people to

resume an active life in their family, their workplace, their school and their community.

Why is it important to join the Australian Organ Donor Register? Registration of donation decisions has a direct influence on our do-

World Transplant Games 2017

The World Transplant Summer Games were held in Malaga, Spain from the 25th of June to the 2nd of July this year. These games celebrate successful organ transplantation and the gift of life. Australia had a successful outing at the Summer Games this year coming 6th overall with a total of 71 medals(see table for medal tally). 2,200 athletes from 60 member countries participated in the Games.
