After getting feedback from last year's riders and volunteers, we have made next year's Tour a shorter, 5-day event, riding the Great Ocean Road from Warrnambool to Melbourne. The planning for the Tour is well under way, and nearly all rider places are filled. If you are interested in riding the Tour, you need to book your spot ASAP so you don't miss out! Already we have a range of new and returning riders; transplant recipients, carers and supporters; men and women; and 30 year olds to 60 year olds! It's going to be a fantastic event, and you can find out more about it in this edition of The Circulator.

If you aren't able to ride, but would like to participate in the 2016 Tour, keep an eye out for details of the final night fundraising dinner in Geelong on the 5th March 2016, and be at next year's (early) Easter BBQ on the 6th March 2016 to welcome in the riders and celebrate the end of a fantastic event. There are also a range of volunteering duties in the lead up to the Tour – we'd love to hear from anyone who would be interested in getting involved. While the Tour is our flagship fundraising event, we have had an extremely successful fundraiser going over the past few months that you may have noticed in the pathology corridor display case, or may have seen in the bookshop at The Alfred. The Breathing to a New Beat Tech-

nicolour Dream Book - a colouring book for adults and kids alike – has been going gangbusters with over 600 copies sold. Breathing to a New Beat (as it's affectionately known) is the brainchild of HLTTV's own Camille Condon. She gathered together 34 creative types to contribute their artwork for free to put the book together. It is an amazing initiative - and we hope you've all bought one and are busy colouring in the pages. Books will continue to be available at the bookshop and also online through www.curlypopsfundraising.bigcartel. com. Camille also happens to be the go-to person on the committee for any of our members interested in organising a community-based fundraising initiative for us - so if you have an idea for a HLTTV fundraiser. contact us and we'll put you in touch with Camille – she definitely has the skills and know-how to assist you in making your idea a success!

Just a reminder that the HLTTV memberships run with the financial year - so we are coming up to membership renewal time! The 2016 Tour de Transplant is here...

a second Tour to help those with a second chance at life!

The 2014 Tour was an outstanding success for all who participated; not only raising over \$250,000 but also providing riders with a fantastic experience. Here are a couple of quotes from riders:

Next year's cycling challenge will be a 5 day event from 2 to 6 March 2016, covering 600km along the most amazing and scenic parts of the Great Ocean Road and will be led by Australian cycling legend Phil Anderson. As well as the personal challenge of the ride, participants will be raising funds for HLTTV's Second Chance Accommodation Program.

Why 600km? To acknowledge the 600 regional Victorian and interstate heart and lung transplant recipients who have needed help with accommodation since transplants began at The Alfred Hospital, Melbourne in 1989.

The Tour is a once-in-a-lifetime chance to spend 5 days learning from one of Australia's true sporting icons. Phil was the first non-European to wear the yellow jersey on the Tour de France and won 2 stages. He is also a Commonwealth Games gold medallist.

The Tour Route



Wednesday 2 March Transit Melbourne – Warrnambool Stage 1 Warrnambool – Port Campbell 79km

Thursday 3 March Stage 2 Port Campbell - Lorne 149km

Friday 4 March Stage 3 Lorne – Lorne 129km

Saturday 5 March Stage 4 Lorne – Geelong 149km

Sunday 6 March Stage 5 Geelong – Melbourne 94km This route is designed for "elite riders" i.e. those intent on cycling at high average speeds with their "race faces on" !!

A shorter, but still challenging, route for the "enthusiast rider" is an option for those slower cyclists keen on a milestone ride for the HLLTV cause.

The "Elite rider" will be capable of riding over 100kms each Tour day, averaging speeds 25-32kph under pressure. We would expect them to be generally cycling 2-3 times a week, covering in excess of 300kms a week, have experience riding in a pack and have a moderate to high fitness level (with possibly some racing experience, although not essential).

The "Enthusiast rider" will be capable of riding 40-70km each Tour day, averaging speeds of 18-25kph. We would expect them to be generally cycling twice a week, for example a long weekend ride and a short midweek ride, and having a moderate fitness level. It will include those new to road cycling, or wanting to learn the techniques of pack riding or even a "tired elite" rider!

The HLTTV Second Chance Accommodation Project Testomonial

The following is a testimonial from lung transplant clinic nurse Kelina Attard. She is in a position to assess the difference that this project is making to transplant recipients and carers.

The second chance accommodation project simply put has saved lives.

The Alfred Hospital Heart and Lung Transplant Units transplant patients from Tasmania, Victoria and South Australia and have also transplanted QLD and NSW patients.

These patients commonly have been unwell for a period of time pre transplant and often experience financial hardship as they are incapable of working and mostly have to survive on disability pensions.

To achieve good outcomes post transplantation the patients need to be monitored closely, receive education on life style changes and participate in a gruelling physiotherapy regime. It is for this reason that they must reside within a reasonable distance to the Alfred Hospital in Melbourne. Over a three month period, which often can be extended longer, patients visit the hospital up to 5 times per week.

The Second Chance Accommodation Project provided by the not for profit organisation "The Heart and Lung Transplant Trust" helps those who otherwise wouldn't be able to afford to reside closer to the Alfred. To have a transplant this is imperative. It is important to remember that often the patients are still paying mortgages or rent and bills at home during the rehabilitation period. Post transplant, not having to worry about accommodation financial costs, lightens the burden on patients and carers. It allows them to have peace of mind and to focus on healing and reaching their goals of living a normal quality of life like anyone else. The patients are very grateful. Being located close to the Alfred means that patients have extra confidence on discharge as they are literally located a few minutes from the Alfred Hospital. Logistically it is just so practical when they are having regular bloods test, scans and appointments not having to deal with long car rides, traffic and associated costs. Illness and associated treatments provide a great deal of stress on families. The Second Chance Accommodation Project helps to alleviate the extra pressure of financial hardship in the recovery period. It has helped to provide a much required support to families and carers post transplant. What the Second Chance Accommodation Project offers is truly amazing!

In this issue we have an example of our single biggest fund raising endeavour - The Tour de Transplant. *As you can see the funds are used* to make a difference and we ask all our members to think of ways they *can contribute to keep this project* going.

Simon is survived by his parents Bruce and Sue, his sister Jacqueline. his brother-inlaw Wayne and nieces Ellie and Isabelle.

Roxanne Kavanagh, the chair of Transplant Australia, has informed the HLTTV of the death of Lyn Budge. Her dedication to Transplant Australia is recorded in a statement by Transplant Australia:

"Transplant Australia lost one of its ardent supporters last week. More importantly Australia lost one of its longest surviving heart transplant recipients.

Lyn Budge, Transplant Australia Life Member passed away after a long illness.

Lyn joined Transplant Australia Vic/Tas Branch in 1988 and has maintained her membership since. She received a heart transplant in 1986. Lyn contributed at both a Branch and Games level as a Committee Member, Treasurer, delegate to Disability Sports Victoria and the Department of Sport & Recreation.

She attended every Transplant Games in Australia and numerous World Transplant Games. Her funeral was held on April 14 in Melbourne where hundreds of

transplant recipients donned their green World Transplant jackets to honour her.

She was awarded Life Membership of Transplant Australia in 2009.

She will be sorely missed.

Ms Kavanagh delivered the following speech at Lyn's funeral:

I first met Lyn in 1996 at the National Transplant Games in Adelaide. She had received a heart transplant in Sydney in 1986. Operated on by Victor Chang and assisted by Don Esmore who was later to open the Melbourne Clinic at the Alfred Hospital. In 1999 Lyn and I teamed up as roommates in Budapest at the World Transplant Games where we won a Silver Medal in the ten pin bowling – this was quite a feat as the bowling balls had no holes and there were only nine pins to knock down. We teamed up in Japan in 2001 and again won medals for Australia in ten pin.

With the Ansett frequent flyer points we had accrued, we travelled to England and Singapore, visiting Stonehenge and choosing

tours. Singapore was just a holiday to do some shopping. Lyn was tough, passionate – especially where Essendon was concerned, and always showed fair sportsmanship in all the events she participated in. She was an all-rounder, giving an*ything a go, making sure that* no one missed out and putting her hand up to partner anyone in need. She always supported those around her. This made her *many friends, not only from other* Australian Teams but also from overseas teams who over the years, looked forward to seeing her at the games so they could catch up.

As a longstanding member of Transplant Australia her presence will be greatly missed, both on the sporting field and on the Victorian Committee where she served for many years as our treasurer.

Farewell to the first person I ever met at a transplant games, a true friend who will not be forgotten."

De Luxe Brussel Sprout Salad



Ingredients

1 cup walnuts 1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped 1 cup freshly made breadcrumbs 1kg brussel sprouts 2 tbsp walnut oil 2 tbsp parsley, finely chopped Sea salt

Directions:

Chop the walnuts into smallish pieces and dry toast lightly in a fry pan. Set aside.

Over medium heat in a medium fry pan warm the olive oil and fry the garlic stirring constantly so that garlic does not burn. Take off the heat and stir in the breadcrumbs.

Steam the brussel sprouts until tender. While still warm place the brussel sprouts in a large bowl and in a small saucepan and heat over toss with the walnut oil. Add the breadcrumb mixture, the chopped parsley and the chopped roasted walnuts and toss well. Place on a serving plate and sprinkle with sea salt to taste.

Serve warm or at room temperature. Serves 4 to 6.

Tuna Patties with Lemon Dill Sauce



Ingredients

```
1 (350g) tin tuna
¾ cup seasoned bread
crumbs
1/4 cup minced spring onion
1 egg
1/2 cup skim milk
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon
zest
 Lemon Dill Sauce:
 ¼ cup chicken stock
 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 ¼ teaspoon dried dill
```

Directions:

In large bowl, combine tuna, breadcrumbs, green onion, egg, milk, and lemon peel.

With lightly floured hands, form mixture into patties.

Spray a large nonstick skillet with cooking spray and heat over medium heat.

Cook patties, until golden brown on both sides, about 3 minutes per side.

Sauce: combine all ingredients medium heat until warm.

Add a small amount of flour and mix with a whisk to thicken sauce.

Spoon sauce over tuna patties and serve.
