Getting to know - Megan O'Leary

Megan has recently started as a Social Work Assistant and is working across the heart and lung transplant teams at The Alfred. Make sure you say hi to her next time you're in at clinic!

You're new to The Alfred transplant teams. Can you tell us a bit about your background and how you came to be working at The Alfred?

I've been interested in working in Health for as long as I can remember. After finishing school I completed a Bachelor of Science, majoring in Psychology, at Monash University. In 2015 I began my Master of Social Work through Monash University before transferring into a Postgraduate Diploma of Psychology for 2016. Before working at the Alfred I worked as a Research Assistant for a Youth Drug and Alcohol Service. My first exposure to Alfred Health was in 2014 when I completed a placement with their Child and Youth Mental Health Service (CYMHS). Through my time at CYMHS I gained a great appreciation for the fantastic staff, and inspiring work done by Alfred Health and was very excited to be offered an opportunity to join the team at the Alfred Hospital.

The social work assistant position is a new job within the transplant units. Can you tell us how this role will help people before and after transplant?

Part of my role as the social work assistant is to aid patients both pre and post-transplant in accessing support. This includes assisting in the filling out of financial assistance forms as well as setting up accommodation for patients who are travelling from interstate or country Victoria. I am also responsible for keeping records on accommodation that is provided to transplant patients, in order to make sure that we are effectively catering for the needs of patients and no one is slipping under the radar.



How is the assistant role different to that of the social workers?

The Social Workers have a much wider role within the transplant service and are kept very busy assisting patients in a variety of ways throughout their whole journey. My role is more focused on pre and post-transplant support where patients are in need of assistance in order to access services before entering hospital and after being discharged.

What have you found out so far about transplant or the transplant community that has surprised you?

I was surprised to learn that the Alfred is one of only a select few hospitals in Australia that offers Lung Transplant. It is quite impressive and inspiring to watch everyone in the Lung Transplant team working together, each adding their own little piece, in order to achieve such a life changing goal.

What do you like about working with people who have transplants?

There are a number of great things about working with people with transplants! Watching patients' quality of life improve post-transplant is very rewarding! Being able to help make the whole transplant process even a tiny bit less stressful through assisting

with any paperwork/ accommodation needs is also a great feeling!

What do you do for fun?

I enjoy travelling, seeing new places and planning my next adventure. I spend a fair amount of time catching up with friends at the local park as we all attempt to wear out our energetic dogs. I love animals and have spent a lot of time working with dogs and horses over the years although time constraints has made this more difficult of late.

What's your favourite food?

I could live off Avocados! My guilty pleasure would have to be Thai food though. And of course I'm quite partial to chocolate!

What's the best holiday you've ever been on?

Andrew Hunt's transplant story

Andrew Hunt is a HLTTV who regularly updates our readers on his transplant journey. This is his third instalment since his 2008 heart transplant. Take it away, Andrew...

STILL HAVEN'T PURCHASED THAT ROCKING CHAIR, AS YET!

Just a quick update on a few things post my heart transplant 29 January 2008.

In my previous two short stories, I reckoned I wasn't ready for the rocking chair and luckily for me that remains the case.

In July 2008, after fifteen months off work, I returned to my role in Human Resources in the state public sector where I worked on a part-time basis until leaving in July 2013. My partner, Dana, also left the state public sector in September 2013.

Since leaving the state public sector, I have completed a Certificate IV in Employment Services and done a bit of job searching and, as I have a keen interest in HR and employment related matters, I am volunteering in the not-for-profit sector at an organisation called DOME ("Don't Overlook Mature Expertise"), where I interview and provide support to mature age job seekers.

Since my heart transplant we have done a bit of travel, including Sydney, Perth, The Great Ocean Road (a few times), Broken Hill and taken "auctioned" holidays in Victor Harbour, Portland, Wallaroo, Cape Jervis, Marion Bay and Robe. Pre transplant, I was generally stuck at home too sick to do anything.

Not working since July 2013 has provided much time for reflective thought. We will never forget arriving



at the Alfred 29 January 2008 to discuss the implantation of a Left Ventricular Assist Device (LVAD), only to be informed by 1 pm that a donor heart was available - amazing luck!

As I continue to power walk on the treadmill at my gym, I frequently recall my pre transplant "life" when I was breathless just getting out my chair, my lungs filling up with fluid, the constant insomnia, the timely shocks from my defibrillator, the unrelenting dehydration caused by extreme doses of frusimide, the toxic side effects of amiodarone, the frequent inpatient stays, being on and off work so often and feeling awful, most of the time.

I still become emotional after power walking 8 kms on the treadmill at my gym in just under sixty minutes (never any jogging or running), a speed I would never imagined possible while sitting in my wheel chair in Fawker Park early 2008.

Tour de Transplant - Jersey Presentation

The Tour de Transplant bike ride raises funds for HLTTV's Second Chance Accommodation Program as well as promoting community awareness of organ & tissue donation.

In 2014 the inaugural event raised a staggering \$250,000 for the program therefore enabling six apartments to be available for transplant families for the next two years. The 2016 Tour will ensure we can continue to provide these apartments to these families in desperate need.

There are five women and thirty men on the 2016 Tour, with the average age being 47, with the youngest rider 24 and the eldest 66. In geographic representation we have riders from New South Wales, Australian Capital Territory, Tasmania & Victoria. There are four transplant recipients riding; Rebecca Berry (lungs), Matthew Orchard (heart), Larry Virtue (heart and our oldest rider) and Louisa Walsh (lungs). As well as riders from the transplant community of family and friends, the rest of the group consists of riders from 2014 returning, some with friends, and new sponsored riders & committed cyclists.

On the evening of 3 February, Bells Hotel hosted our rider jersey and sponsor presentation, expertly MC'd by Gerry Hanily. The event was a great success! Riders, sponsors and friends heard all abut the work of the HLTTV, the amazing work of The Alfred transplant units, and the important that the Second Chance **Accommodation Program plays**

in easing the financial burden of transplant on recipients and their families.

Riders were also briefed on the operational matters of the Tour, and heard from the Tour leader - Phil Anderson OAM - about what would likely follow during their five day journey. Riders were then individually presented with their riding jerseys by Phil.



Living with Lung Transplantation: What is it like? Can we do better?

Kev Points

- Lung transplantation at The Alfred improves quality of life and symptoms for patients with advanced lung diseases.
- Patients and their carers would like more support both before and after transplantation
- In response to these findings, the lung transplant program is now being redesigned to better meet our community's needs both now and into the future.


Lung transplantation is a complex and comprehensive treatment that is offered to increasing numbers of carefully selected patients with advanced lung diseases. The Lung Transplant Service at The Alfred is one of the largest and most experienced programs in the world. Over the last few years, not only have we been performing more transplants, our transplant patients are now living longer than ever before.

But are our transplant patients also living better? What is living with lung transplantation actually like for our patients and their families? And can we do better?

In order to answer these questions, we conducted the "Living with Lung Transplantation" study in 2015, in which we surveyed patients and their carers at different stages of lung transplantation, and asked them about their quality of life, symptoms and supportive care needs. Many of the readers of The Circulator are likely to have been part of this Australia-first study. We are now finalising our data analysis and would like to share with you what we have found so far.

Lung transplantation improves quality of life and symptoms

One of the key findings of our study is that patients report a much better quality of life and fewer symptoms (such as feeling short of breath or feeling tired) after transplantation. While this might sound obvious, it has actually never been studied in Australia before! In fact, transplant recipients at The Alfred enjoy a quality of life that is comparable to the rest of the Australian population. Interestingly (and perhaps surprisingly), transplantation does not appear to change their carer's quality of life.



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More support is needed both before and after transplantation

The survey also revealed that patients and carers at The Alfred would like more support both before and after transplantation. While we might expect someone to need lots of help before transplantation (especially if they are living with a poor quality of life and lots of symptoms as we've just discussed), we might not have expected them to need much assistance after transplantation.

As it turns out, people want different things depending on where they are on the transplant journey. We also discovered that patients and carers often want help with different things. For example, pre-transplant patients would like more support with understanding what is happening with they health and treatment, as well as helping their family and friends cope with their illness, while their pre-transplant carers want more information about what to expect in the future, as well as more practical assistance at home. In contrast, post-transplant patients want more help with paying for their healthcare, while their carers would like more support with dealing with their own worries and finding time for themselves.

Can we do better?

Results from this study have many important implications. First of all, it provides a baseline or benchmark for future Australian studies in lung transplantation. From now on, not only can we measure if our patients are living longer – we can also gauge if they are living better. Secondly, now that we know what our patients and families would like more help with, we are keen to do better and have already started to redesign our program to address some of these needs. Thirdly, while we've always known that our patients and families are key members of the lung transplant team, this study has helped to give them a voice at the table. We would certainly love to do more of this if we can!

Finally, we would like to say a big thank you to everyone who has participated in and/or helped with the "Living with Lung Transplantation" study over the past twelve months. A more detailed study summary will soon be on its way to those who have requested it, and will also be available in lung transplant clinic for those who are interested.
